TIME MARCHES ON

INTRODUCING

Russell B. Cross of Framingham, well-known watercolorist and current president of the Framingham Artists' Guild. BVAA members who enjoy an association with the Framingham Artists' Guild perhaps are familiar with Mr. Cross' exceptional work as a watercolorist and as a lecturer. A native of Augusta, Maine, Mr. Cross studied at the Pratt Institute of Fine and Applied Arts and, later, launched a successful career in advertising and illustration in New York City. He carried that career into Massachusetts and into New Hamoshire. His work has appeared in national publications, including both Colliers magazine and the Saturday Evening Post, to which he was a regular contributor. Mr. Cross also has enjoyed a number of private and public gallery affiliations during his long career and his paintings are part of many art collections across the United States. He is a longtime teacher in the Framingham area and, today, much in demand as a painting demonstrator to local art groups. Mr. Cross is a member of the Copley Society of Boston and the New Hamoshire Art Association. During his tenure as president of the Framingham Artists Guild, that organization teamed up with the Premier Image Gallery of Ashland, presenting to the public an unusual tribute exhibition by members of the Guild, which ran successfully for more than six weeks. The BVAA is honored to present Russell Cross, who promises our March 18 meeting an entertaining and informative program.

ANNUAL MEETING
